



# March 20, 2024 SPECIAL INTEREST



Though women's rights issues were voiced as far back as the early 1800's, the first National Women's Day was not declared until February 28, 1909. This day was organized by Theresa Malkiel and designated by the Socialist Party of America as the first National Women's Day. This took place at the same time that there was a demonstration being held in New York City's Lower East Side, in the garment district. Women were protesting child labor, sweatshop conditions, and they were also demanding women's suffrage.

Around the same time, other feminist leaders overseas were discussing when they might celebrate the special women in their communities. In 1910, an International Conference of Working Women was held in Copenhagen, Denmark. An International Socialist Women's Conference was organized ahead of a general meeting of the Socialist International Conference of Communist Women. German activist Clara Zetkin convinced them to create a worldwide version of the American holiday recognizing women. On March 19, 1911, the first International Women's Day was held in four European countries. Then, in 1917, that date changed to March 8th because, on that day, women textile workers in Petrograd, Russia, took to the streets to protest food shortages, poor working and living conditions, and the issue of suffrage. Four years later, in 1921, this historic strike gave rise to the Russian Revolution, and so March 8th became the date to recognize International Women's Day.

### Women's History Month by Kristy Frazier

In the United States, in 1920, the 19th Amendment to the Constitution was ratified, ensuring the right of women to vote, and in 1923 an Equal Rights Amendment was introduced stating, "Men and women shall have equal rights throughout the United States, and every place subject to its jurisdiction."

For several decades following, with the advent of the Dust Bowl, the Depression, and World War II, the celebration of this special day became a bit muted in the United States. Still, women's rights were fiercely fought for in the 1960's when the Women's Liberation Movement became the largest, broadest social movement in United States history. Then, in 1975, the United Nations sponsored the recognition of International Women's Day, and now dozens of countries acknowledge the tireless efforts made in furthering women's rights, and the need to continue the efforts to gain and ensure the equality of women throughout the world.

Here in California, the recognition of Women's History began in 1978 as a local week-long celebration in Santa Rosa. The Education Task Force of the Sonoma County Commission on the Status of Women planned the week and timed it with International Women's Day. Local advocates formed the National Women's History Alliance, and in 1980 they led a coalition of women's groups to successfully lobby President Carter to issue a proclamation recognizing National Women's History Week.

Finally, in 1987, after being petitioned by the National Women's History Alliance, Congress passed Public Law 100-9, designating the month of March as Women's History Month, and President Regan signed it into law. Other countries celebrate International Women's Day, but the United States is the only country that devotes an entire month to the recognition of women.

Ultimately, since 1995, Presidents have issued annual proclamations celebrating the many contributions women have made to the United States, and to recognize the specific achievements that women have made over the course of American history in a variety of fields. (cont. on pg. 9)

### HARLEY WOMEN IN HISTORY

Women have always been a part of the Harley-Davidson® family

As early as the 1910s, female riders did everything the men did, from lazy weekend rides to long-distance journeys. In fact, in 1915, a mother and daughter by the names of Avis and Effie Hotchkiss made history by crossing America - twice - on a three-speed V-Twin with a sidecar. The following year, Enthusiast magazine began publication, featuring many early accounts of women and motorcycling.

AS THE DECADES PROGRESSED, MORE AND MORE WOMEN DISTINGUISHED THEMSELVES AS GREAT MOTORCYCLE ENTHUSIASTS, MOST NOTABLY THE FOLLOWING: Vivian Bales of Albany, Georgia drew attention for her 5,000-mile round-trip journey from her home through the upper Midwest in 1929. Bales appeared on two different covers of The Enthusiast, and was later dubbed "The Enthusiast Girl."

Dorothy "Dot" Robinson, the wife of dealer Earl Robinson, competed alongside men in endurance races during the Depression. She was also co-owner of the Detroit dealership and a motorcycle courier during World War II. Known as "The First Lady of Motorcycling," she estimated logging over 1.5 million miles on motorcycles throughout her lifetime. (cont. on page 9)



This year President Biden stated, "Throughout history, the vision and achievements of powerful women strengthened our Nation and opened the doors of opportunity wider for all of us. Though their stories too often go untold, all of us stand on the shoulders of these sung and unsung trailblazers-from the women who took a stand as suffragists, abolitionists, and labor leaders, to pioneering scientists and engineers, groundbreaking artists, proud public servants, and brave members of our Armed Forces."

This year's theme is, "Women Who Advocate for Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion." Leading the way, for women was Gerda Lerner.

Gerda Kronstein Lerner (April 30, 1920 – January 2, 2013) was born in Vienna, Austria, to an affluent Jewish family. Her father was a pharmacist, and her mother was an artist. She and her younger sister attended local schools, and frequented the gymnasium. After the 1938 Anschluss (the incorporation of Austria into Germany), she joined the Anti-Nazi Resistance. That year, her father escaped to Switzerland. She and her mother were jailed for six weeks due to their Anti-Nazi rhetoric. Once released, her mother moved to France, and she immigrated to the United States under the sponsorship of the family of Bobby Jensen, her fiance at that time. That relationship dissolved and she ended up marrying Carl Lerner, a Hollywood film-maker. In 1951 they returned to New York, where she enrolled in the New School for Social Research. She began to ponder about, "people who did not have a voice in telling their own stories." She went on to earn a Ph.D. in history, and offered the first regular course in women's history. She continued her graduate studies at Columbia University, earning both an MA and a Ph. D.

In 1966, Lerner became a founding member of the National Organization for Women. Then, in 1968, she taught at Sarah Lawrence College, and developed a Master of Arts Program in Women's History. It was the first American graduate degree in its field. In the 60's and 70's she published scholarly books and articles that helped establish women's history as a recognized field of study.

In 1979, Lerner chaired the Women's History Institute, co-sponsored by Sarah Lawrence College, the Women's Action Alliance, and the Smithsonian Institute. It was attended by the leaders of national organizations for women and girls. When these participants learned about the success of Women's History Week, celebrated in Sonoma, California, they decided to create their own commemorations within their own organizations, communities, and school districts. They agreed to help secure a National Women's History Week, which helped lead to the national establishment of Women's History Month.

Wikipedia report: Though the mathematicians are ultimately replaced by electronic computers, a textual epilogue reveals Mary obtained her engineering degree and became NASA's first female African American engineer: Dorothy continued as NASA's first African American supervisor; and Katherine, accepted by Stafford as a report coauthor, went on to calculate the trajectories for the Apollo 11 and Space Shuttle missions. In 2015, she was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom. In 2016, NASA dedicated the Langley Research Center's Katherine Johnson Computational Building in her honor.

What's more, music has been scientifically proven to keep your brain young and healthy. And "expressive writing may also offer physical benefits to people battling terminal or lifethreatening diseases... Writing about emotions and stress can boost immune functioning in patients with such illnesses as HIV/AIDS, asthma, and arthritis."

Try anything and everything that lights you up: Make your life a work of art

The key is to find something meaningful you enjoy doing that helps you 1) live from your heart center and 2) discover that magic moment of being in the flow. Just following the tug of curiosity and bursts of inspiration—or simply noodling around—opens pathways of discovery and deep healing. Whatever you do, be sure to silence your inner critic. As Miles Davis said, "Do not fear mistakes. There are none." A perceived "mistake" can take you to a delicious landscape that wasn't on your map. If you need guidance, find an expressive arts teacher.

All that's required is your unique expression of your true nature. That, my friend, will put you on the road to healing.---

The club became home to Dot Robinson, who was its first president, as well as countless others into the present day. More modern times have witnessed the creation Trailblazer Bessie Stringfield left her mark on the sport of motorcycling by being the first African-American woman to complete a solo cross-country ride. During the '30s and '40s, she traveled through all of the lower 48 states and rode abroad in Europe, Brazil, and Haiti. She also joined an army motorcycle dispatch unit during World War II, making runs across America. of the clubs "Women in the Wind" and "Women on Wheels," which boast large numbers of members and local chapters across North America. Today, one in ten riders is a woman, and female riders are the fastestgrowing segment of the riding population.


